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## Urial Clark 1863 & 1865 Diary Highlights

- Jan 1, 1863      In camp at Camp Jewett near White's Ford, Md. Received box of clothing from Brookfield
- Jan 2              Rode mule to Conrads Ferry
- Jan 3              Companies. E, O, G & H called out to battle, but proved to be Union troops
- Jan 17             George W. Bartlett, Co. E, of Arlington died in the night
- Jan 28             Henry L. Clark of Barre & Joseph Martin, Co. I, of Swanton died
- Feb 2              Promoted to First Sergeant, Company G
- Feb 7              Went to Poolsville, Md, had picture taken with Capt. George B. Damon of Newbury
- Feb 20             George E. Mason of Brookfield took ill, went to get Dr. Almon Clark of Barre in the night
- March 6            Jotham Sherman died [Co. G., of West Fairlee]
- Apr 18             Went to Camp Hintzelman, Pont of Rocks, Md
- May 9              Discouraging news from Hooker [Losses at Chancellorsville by a force half its size]
- May 12             Pistols presented to Major Charles G. Chandler and Company [10<sup>th</sup> Regt., of St, Albans]
- May 25             News arrived of the Capture of Vicksburg
- Jun 2              Unloaded a boat at Edwards Ferry, Md
- Jun 11             Whole brigade turned out for a fight, but no Rebs appeared
- Jun 16             Attack expected from Lee's Army, heavy cannonading in the vicinity of Harpers Ferry, Va
- Jun 21             Cannonading heard in the vicinity of Snickers Gap, all day
- Jun 24             Orders to march for Harpers Ferry, camped in an open field near the Monocacy River.
- Jun 30             Magazine blew up killing six and wounding several. Went as far as Petersville, Md.
- Jul 1              Proceeded to Frederick, Md.
- Jul 3              A boy from the Md. Regiment drowned in the Monocacy River. Officer's wives went home.
- Jul 5              Stayed at Middletown, Md. Fine ladies in the city.
- Jul 6              Left for South Mountain Gap. Rebel prisoners, 975 men, 50 wagons, passed down the ountain pike road the, 3 Cos. guarded them to Frederick.
- Jul 8              Heavy firing in the vicinity of Boonsboro
- Jul 9              Rejoined the 3<sup>rd</sup> Corps and marched to Pleasant Valley, Md
- Jul 10             Enroute for Williamsport, Md
- Jul 11             Advanced to within 3 miles from Hagerstown, Md. Camped with French Division [ 8<sup>th</sup> Corps]

Jul 12 Arranged into Harris Brigade and stationed in a line of battle in a wheatfield, considerable firing heard in the vicinity of Williamsport

Jul 14 Moved to Williamsport, found the enemy just across the river

Jul 15 Marched toward Sandy Hook, Md., very hot many fell out and some died

Jul 17 Crossed pontoon bridge at Harper's Ferry and arrived at Loudoun Heights at daybreak

Jul 20 Moved from Snickers Gap to Upperville, Va

Jul 21 Ander [ ] made head of detail to return to Vermont for conscripts

Jul 22 Moved to Parris Junction

Jul 23 Proceeded to Manassas Gap, battle commenced, enemy driven 2 miles. Several killed and wounded upon our side. Enemy left in the night.

Jul 25 Proceeded through Warrenton, Va and remained for several days

Aug 1 Moved 7 miles to Rappahannock River and parked

Aug 4 Heavy firing in the vicinity of Culpeper

Aug 10 Went to Catlett's Station, Va and drew 32 horses

Aug 19 Went to Bealton Station, Va with the sick. Went to Cannfield and was arrested and was taken to Corps headquarters. Sent back to camp under arrest.

Sep 15 Orders to move to Culpeper. Carried sick to Bealton. Moved the train to Seeman's Ford.

Sep 17 Reached Culpeper, Va at 7 PM

Oct 11 Army in retreat, 3<sup>rd</sup> Corps crossed Rapidan and camped for the night, enemy opposite us

Oct 12 Skirmishing through the day, mostly cavalry

Oct 13 Retreated through Bealton, near Warrenton, drawn into a line of battle. No enemy in force. Proceeded to Greenwich, Va and arrived about 3 PM

Oct 14 Arrived at Centreville, Va, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Corps covering the retreat. Crossed Bull Run about 1 pm. Heavy engagement between the enemy and 2<sup>nd</sup> Corps [ ]

Oct 15 Went to Union Mills, Va, slight skirmishing and was called out with the stretcher bearers

Oct 16 Carried the sick to Fairfax Station, Va

Oct 19 Marched southward and parked near Manassas Junction, Va

Oct 20 Passed through battlefield at Bristoe Station. Parked near Greenwich, Va

Nov 4 Surgeon Clark came to treat me for dysentery

Nov 7 Left for Kelly's Ford, heavy skirmishing at the crossing. Captured 1,300 prisoners.

Nov 8 Division left and encountered the enemy near Brandy Station. 3<sup>rd</sup> Division drove them. Camped near station, with the Old Vermont Brigade camped near by.

Nov 14 Paid off, received \$34.00

Feb 5, 1865 5<sup>th</sup> Corps and parts of the 2<sup>nd</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup> & 9<sup>th</sup> made a grand attack on the South Side Road Drove the enemy and gained some ground, but with great loss.

Apr 2 6<sup>th</sup> Corps. assaulted the Rebbel [sic.] lines near Fort Fisher. Carrying them in the fight. loss dividing the rebbel [sic] lines Corps advanced toward Petersburg

Arp 5 Forced the enemy to figt us a Sailors Runn

Apr 9 General Lee surrendered his whole army in Appomattox County

Apr 16 **News of the assasination of President Lincoln & Seward Great excitement**

Apr 19 Army in morning for **President Lincoln** Flags at half masts. Services at the Div. in honor

Apr 28 Gen Johnson surrendered his Army to Gen Sherman on the same train of Gen Lee

May 16 Sergeant Green shot by a bushwacker

May 21 Arrived Manchester

May 24 March in Review through Richmond. Crossed the Chickahominy & camped at Hanover Court House

May 29 Reached Fredericksburg

Jun 8 Arrived in Washington and Marching in Review

Jun 22 Mustered out of the United State Service

Jun 23 Broke Camp at Bailey's Cross Roads for home. Took cars from Washington for Baltimore, via Philadelphia

Jun 24 Crosse Ferry took cars for South Amboy. Took Ferry and arrived in New York at 7 PM.

**May, THURSDAY, 7. 1863.**

Very dark & wind. Drill in the morning. Very rainy during the remainder of the day. Mail 2 letters, one from L & one from Ann.

**FRIDAY, 8.**

Very rainy day.

**SATURDAY, 9.**

Sat. very pleasant & on guard at the Qtrs department. Discouraging news from Hooker.

**May, SUNDAY, 10. 1863.**

Very warm. Came off guard. Meeting in the pm, also in the evening

**MONDAY, 11.**

Extremely hot. No more news

**TUESDAY, 12.**

Very hot day. Pistols presented to Major Chandler & C. Heard thunderstorm in the pm & evening

**May, WEDNESDAY, 13. 1863.**

Warm & muggy

**THURSDAY, 14.**

Showery & cool. Unwell off duty  
Mail arrived but nothing for me

**FRIDAY, 15.**

Very cool & pleasant day\_

**May, SATURDAY, 16. 1863.**

Very cool & pleasant. No drill in the afternoon & C. Mail arrived pm, letter from father & one from P

**SUNDAY, 17.**

Very warm day. Company inspection in the morning by Lieut Newton [

**MONDAY, 18.**

Very cool & pleasant. On guard at the general guard house

**May, TUESDAY, 19. 1863.**

Came off guard. Battalion drill on the am. Fired blank cartridges

**WEDNESDAY, 20.**

Very warm day. Excused from the 10 o clock drill on account of severe cold. Mail, but no letters

**THURSDAY, 21.**

On guard at the gen guard house. Very hot day  
Mail arrived. One letter from Bill & one from P.

**May, FRIDAY, 22. 1863.**

Exceedingly warm day. Drill as ever through the day

**SATURDAY, 23.**

Very hot day. No drill in the pm. Mail arrived but nothing for me.

**SUNDAY, 24.**

Exceedingly warm. Mustering in the afternoon also evening

**May, MONDAY, 25. 1863.**

Quite cool. Drills as usual. News arrived of the [capture of Vicksburg](#) May 25.

**TUESDAY, 26.**

Very cold day. Co drills & battalion as usual. Mail arrived but no letter & C.

**WEDNESDAY, 27.**

Very beautiful day. On guard at the gen guard house.

**May, THURSDAY, 28. 1863.**

Came off guard. On fatigue in the afternoon. Capt Damon drilled in Battalion Command. Mail arrived, one letter from Ann

**FRIDAY, 29.**

Warm & cool. calling cloudy pm, indications of rain. Drills as usual. Battalion conducted by Capt Hunt

[Lucius T, Co H, of Springfield]. Played chess considerable

**SATURDAY, 30.**

Very warm. Quiet & no drill in the afternoon. Mail in the forenoon but nothing for me {

**May, SUNDAY, 31. 1863.**

Clear and cool. Battalion inspection at 10 am. Services in the afternoon tent St. Johns 3 chap\_ 16 vers Very well handled

**MONDAY, 1.**

Very pleasant & windy. Co E relieved Co G. No battalion drill, but Co drill to takes its place\_\_\_

**TUESDAY, 2.**

Very mild and windy. Went to Edwards Ferry with fatigue party of 15 to unload a boat. Mail arrived & one letter from P. Co K relieved Co G.

**June, WEDNESDAY, 3. 1863.**

Very pleasant day. All quiet around camp. Nothing new stirring. Pay master arrived in the eve.

**THURSDAY, 4.**

Drill in the am. Were paid off. No battalion drill. Recd two months pay \$34.00

**FRIDAY, 5.**

Very pleasant day. Three drills. Battalion in the pm by Capt Frost [Edwin B. Co A, of St. Johnsbury] poor drill, unwell

**June, SATURDAY, 6. 1863.**

Unwell. but not off from duty. Two morning drills. Mail arrived one from P.

**SUNDAY, 7.**

Sunday beautiful day. Company inspection was excused myself

**MONDAY, 8.**

Very windy day. Unwell with cold but not off duty Mail came in

**June, TUESDAY, 9. 1863.**

Hard cold. Very windy day drills as usual Battalion by Capt\_\_\_

**WEDNESDAY, 10.**

Went on guard. Great excitement during the night Cavalry raid across the river into Senaca()

**THURSDAY, 11.**

The whole brigade turned out in the morning ready for a fight but no Rebs appeared.

**June, FRIDAY, 12. 1863.**

Very warm day. A large force of cavalry crossed the river in pursuit of the Rebs. Have heard nothing from them today. Only one drill during the day. Got mail. One letter from father & one from Ad

**SATURDAY, 13.**

Very warm day. Two drills in the morning

**SUNDAY, 14.**

Very warm & dry. Services in the evening. Wedding in the pm at the Whites Ford lock house bride. Swan [Franklin B.] Co C

**June, MONDAY, 15. 1863.**

Exceedingly warm day. Dry. A detail of men -60- were sent at 7 pm to dig a rifle pit. Worked until eleven. Cong () roll at 3am, Co called out. Expecting the enemy. Mail arrived, one letter from BG Sams

**TUESDAY, 16.**

No drill. But an attack is expected from the Lees Army. Heavy cannonading heard in the vicinity of Har. Ferry. I read Rebel raid into Penn.

**WEDNESDAY, 17.**

No drill. Called out at 12 CC in line of battle but proved to be Stonemans cavarly

**June, THURSDAY, 18. 1863.**

No drill. Very hot & muggy. Heavy thunderstorm in the afternoon. Mail arrived and one letter Ann & one from P.

**FRIDAY, 19.**

No drill. Very warm day Showers with thunder in the afternoon. Battalion inspection at 10 am

**SATURDAY, 20.**

Very cool day. Main regiment arrived in camp. Fighting at river Snickers Gap

**June, SUNDAY, 21. 1863.**

Co inspection in the am. Quite cool. Heavy cannonading heard in the vicinity of Snickers Gap all day\_

**MONDAY, 22.**

Quite cool & pleasant through the day. No drill in the morning but Battalion in the pm by Maj Chandler.

**TUESDAY, 23.**

Commenced drilling quite cool

June, **WEDNESDAY, 24.** 1863.

Orders to march for Harpers Ferry. Tents struck .& ready to leave at 5 pm. We marched as far as Monocacy. Encamped for the night in the open field

**THURSDAY, 25.**

Started at 4 ½ am, reached Point of Rocks at 8. Halted for rest. Moved as far as into within 6 miles if H.F. Rained very hard .& halted for the night. On guard

**FRIDAY, 26.**

Started at 4 am. Reached H. F. at 9. Very tired & wet. Struck our tents in the rain\_

June, **SATURDAY, 27.** 1863.

Cool & somewhat rainy

**SUNDAY, 28.**

Nothing stirring

**MONDAY, 29.**

Went to the river. Orders to leave at 6 in the morning of the 30

June, **TUESDAY, 30.** 1863.

Very rainy day. Mag. blew up killing 6 & wounding several. Left at 3, went as far as Petersville. Rained all night.

July, **WEDNESDAY, 1.**
